Needed: a small American flag and a small cross

P Hello, boys and girls. This weekend we celebrate Memorial Day, a day when we honor those who gave their lives in defending our country. Brave men and women gave their lives on the battlefield so that we could have the freedoms we enjoy in our country today. These soldiers kept us, the citizens of this country, safe and blessed our land with continued life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. We often put a flag like this next to the graves of those soldiers who died as a reminder of the sacrifices that they made for us. (*Wave American flag.*)

We as Christians honor someone else this weekend and every day of our lives. We honor Christ who died on the cross to keep his people, those who believe and trust in him, safe and protected from the enemies of sin, death and the devil. The battle Jesus fought and won for us on the cross has brought the blessings of forgiveness, life and salvation to us forever. We remember how God saved and blessed us through Jesus every time we see a cross like this. (*Hold up cross.*) Sometimes gravestones even are shaped like a cross or have a cross etched into them.

Keeping our eyes focused on the cross of Christ reminds us that the death of Jesus frees to us live for him in this country and this world, and no enemy on earth can take the victory of the cross away from us. Let us pray:

Dear Jesus, as we remember this Memorial Day those who fought and died for our country, help us to remember, too, that you fought and died for us on the cross so that we would be free in you from every sin and evil. Let us honor you with our very lives every day. Amen.

And the Lord has declared today that you are a people for his treasured possession, as he has promised you, and that you are to keep all his commandments, and that he will set you in praise and in fame and in honor high above all nations that he has made, and that you shall be a people holy to the Lord your God, as he promised.

- P So put away all malice and all deceit and hypocrisy and envy and all slander. Like newborn infants, long for the pure spiritual milk, that by it you may grow up into salvation—if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good. As you come to him, a living stone rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, you yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in Scripture: "Behold, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious, and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame." So the honor is for you who believe, but for those who do not believe, "The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone," and "A stone of stumbling, and a rock of offense." They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do. But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

- The **Gospel Reading**, Luke 25:13-35, is spoken by the pastor or other worship leader:
- **P** That very day two of them were going to a village named Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, "What is this conversation that you are holding with each other as you walk?" And they stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, named Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, a man who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things happened. Moreover, some women of our company amazed us. They were at the tomb early in the morning, and when they did not find his body, they came back saying that they had even seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see." And he said to them, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself. So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He acted as if he were going farther, but they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." So he went in to stay with them. When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed and broke it and gave it to them. And their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. And he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the Scriptures?" And they rose that same hour and returned to Jerusalem. And they found the eleven and those who were with them gathered together, saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he was known to them in the breaking of the bread.

• The Homily for Memorial Day is delivered by the pastor:

ℙ The concept of "celebrating Memorial Day" almost seems like an oxymoron, doesn't it?—a contradiction in terms. For Memorial Day, by its very nature, bears witness to the fact that people died—usually not a cause for celebration, "Hey, let's have a holiday, let's have a picnic, let's have a family get-together, let's a church service ... because people died!"

But we do it, don't we? We celebrate Memorial Day and acknowledge—gratefully!—that people died. In fact in the grand scheme of things, we may even come to see their dying as a blessing (although that may sound like a contradiction in terms too).

The holiday was originally inaugurated to remember those who had given their lives in the military, in war. And in their case, the BLESSING is obvious: by their sacrifice—their extreme sacrifice—our nation has been kept free and safe. It was a terrible price to pay, but we regard it as "worth it," and take the time (like this Memorial Day) to honor them for it, and to thank God for the blessings that resulted.

[In my own case, for example, of my 16 great-great-grandparents, the only one whose name I know is the one who died in the Civil War. And besides his name, I also know his story ... as it was told to me by my father and grandfather, and as I have told it, frequently, to my own children. Almost by default, it seems that one who died serving his country is worth remembering.]

Over the years the holiday has grown to include more than just the military. Today we remember folks like valiant firefighters and police officers ... and beyond those in uniform, nowadays Memorial Day is an occasion to remember others who have died: not only long-ago ancestors, but also parents and grandparents, friends, neighbors, co-workers, sometimes even siblings and children.

We remember them as people who have inspired us; we are different because of them; we are BLESSED by their having been here.

And not only individually, but also collectively. We as a congregation, for example, as a community, as a country, find ourselves enriched by the memories of those who have gone before us, and by what they inspire us to be and do.

Sometimes, as in war, the cost of BLESSING is DEATH. We remember them and regard them as blessings because they *died*.

That is certainly true, of course, of our eternal blessing. Every Sunday we gather here to observe a kind of "memorial day"—to remember and recount the blessed fact that as God's children we are SAVED. The title of today's service, you may notice, begins with "SAVE your people." The way that saving came about was that (as an ancient liturgy puts it) "the salvation of the world was hung on the cross." "Christ Jesus died to save sinners," we confess week after week. Without his DEATH, that BLESSING would never be possible.

The Holy Eucharist is also a memorial celebration, isn't it? "Do this for the remembrance of me," Jesus said—to which the Word of God responds, "As often as we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim THE LORD'S DEATH until he comes."

Most of us will not be asked to give our lives for our Lord or for our country. Because others made the supreme sacrifice, we are able to enjoy that blessing. Still, without paying that price, we continue to ask God to "bless our land." Could it be that one of the blessings God intends ... is that we who live should live our lives as beneficiaries of those who died ... and as beneficiaries of our Lord's holy death for all of us.

"Whether we live or die," the Bible says, "we are the Lord's." What a wondrous blessing to have! What a wondrous blessing to share!
